This conference explores ways to make European foreign policy more inclusive and less Eurocentric. After a keynote reflecting on the overall theme on day 1, three academic panels revolve around the question of how to de-center Euro-centric foreign policy prescriptions so to make them more inclusive-participatory and less interventionist. This also entails a critical re-evaluation of existing EU foreign and multilateral policies, especially as it relates to questions of race and migration, gender and sexuality, postcolonial relations, environmental protection and democracy and human rights promotion. These are not only considered in relations to other major actors and challengers, such as the US, Russia or China, but also revisited in the contexts of global (UN) governance and importantly, include non-state actors.
