For his outstanding achievements, the American government has presented him with several awards including the Good Conduct medal, the American Service Medal, the European African Middle Eastern Theater with Three Bronze stars, the World War II Victory Medal with a Bronze arrowhead, and the Purple Heart.

- 13) <u>Mr. LAMBERT Walter</u> was born on February 7th 1925 in Jersey City, New Jersey. He joined the U.S. Navy in December 1942. As a Boatswain's mate second class, on the USS LST25, Mr. Lambert has distinguished himself by his determination and courage, participating in the Liberation of Normandy, where his ship landed troops on Gold Beach on the D-Day. For his outstanding achievements, the American government presented him with several awards such as European African Middle Eastern Medal with four Battle Stars and the Navy Good Conduct Medal.
- 14) <u>Mr. LAMONS</u> <u>Robert</u> was born on June 27th, 1925 in Price, Utah. He joined the U.S. Army in June 1943.
