Join the European & Eurasian Studies Program for the inaugural presentation of its newly launched brown bag series. Professor Elizabeth Terry-Roisin will present a thought-provoking paper exploring the intersection of theology and political theory. She examines how treatises on kingship reflect different views of God, ranging from an image of God as an absolute monarch to one where God governs with a more collaborative relationship to His subjects, bound by the same laws they are.



SPEAKER

Elizabeth Terry-Roisin, Ph.D., is an Assistant Professor in the Department of History. She is a historian of early modern Europe, with a secondary field in medieval Europe. Her research focuses on Spain, Italy, Granada, Genoa, Renaissance and chivalric culture, the Spanish nobility, religious minorities, and the military orders. Her work has been published in Brill's Companion to the Spanish

Renaissance, and she has forthcoming articles in eHumanista and The Historical Journal. She is currently completing a book project on the assimilation of a Morisco family into the Spanish nobility and has begun a second book on the Jesuits. Her current research project builds on questions within the historiography of early modern Europe, particularly the intersection of two fields—kingship and theology—that are often treated separately.
