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On Monday, April 30th, 2014, the two Florida high schools selected in Miami at the Local Euro Challenge Competition on March 13th, (Nova High School, and Trinity Preparatory School) went to New York to represent Florida at the national Euro Challenge Competition, a program created and run by the Delegation of the European Commission, with assistance from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and support

from The Moody's Foundation, Credit Suisse and Deloitte & Touche.

The two teams consisted of five 9th and 10thgrade students each were accompanied by their teachers.

The students were really excited and proud to compete nationally and present their economic challenges and European countries ("Estonia and Aging"; and "Germany and Sustaining the Social Welfare System") before a panel of prestigious judges from the European Community: ambassadors, consuls, EU Delegation officials, and financial experts. Our two teams made it to the finals and won 4th and 5th place.

"We are very proud to represent Florida at the national competition, and this is an excellent opportunity for our students to shine. It has been seven years since the Miami-Florida European Union Center of Excellence began to recruit and organize the local Florida Euro Challenge Competition This year, we are extremely proud of our schools. Since 2007, the MEUCE has selected seventy-three Florida high schools from Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, St. Lucie, Lee, and Orange counties, and sent nineteen to New York to compete nationally. Ninety-four students have gone to New York representing their schools," said Christine I. Caly-Sanchez, Associate Director, MEUCE-FIU and organizer and recruiter of the competition in Florida. "This competition has become a showcase for our Florida schools, and it will continue to grow due to the tremendous response we have received from our local schools".

On May 9th, Europe Day, a holiday that marks each year the pivotal Schuman declaration of 1950 in which Robert Schuman (French foreign minister) proposed the creation of a supranational European community, an idea that laid the foundation for the EU. May 9th celebrates the EU and European integration. In honor of Europe Day, the MEUCE held a screening of the Franco-Austrian film "Nous nous sommes tant haïs" (How we hated each other!). The Franco-Austrian film is a love story that takes place in France and Germany in 1950 and depicts the birth of the European Union.

Also, on that day, a group of aspiring scholars and professionals gathered at Florida International University's (FIU) Modeste A. Maidique campus to be honored for their incredible accomplishments. These young men and women, all recent graduates, some of undergraduate studies and a select few of graduate school, were presented with their European Studies Certificate in a recognition ceremony. These students, by applying their academic energies to understanding more about

European history, politics, and culture, earned this prestigious honor that designates their familiarity with European civilization. The European Studies program at FIU was designed to enhance a student's understanding of European politics, society, and culture, drawing on a broad range of courses in the arts and sciences and thereby to complement the student's major course of study." These certificates, which are available to any undergraduate or graduate student who has an interest in European civilization and culture. requires additional work by students in courses focused on European languages and cultures. Some of these graduates even augmented their experience by participating in study abroad programs, and were able to experience Europe intimately. Whether in honors college courses in Normandy, or European Art history classes at FIU's Wolfsonian University, these students have exerted maximum effort to learn about the many nations and peoples of the European community.

On May 9th, the hard work was done, and these students were prepared to be recognized for

their achievement. The ceremony began with a discussion of the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP) by MEUCE Co-Director Dr. Joaquín Roy of the University of Miami. My name is Bianca Blanchard and in April 2014 I graduated Cum Laude with a Bachelor's Degree in International Relations and a certificate in European Studies. I first heard of the certificate program in the fall semester of my junior year while I was sitting in Prof. Markus Thiel's class learning about European Politics. By then I had already realized how much I enjoyed studying European culture, literature and history and so I

decided to enter the program. Who would have thought that this would be one of the best decisions I would ever make during my time at FIU. Not only had I already completed some of the course requirements for the certificate by taking core International Relations classes but through it I was able to enrich my education with networking and internship experience.

The first opportunity which was presented to me through the certificate program was my internship at the Miami-Florida European Union Center of Excellence under the supervision of Associate Director Christine Caly-Sanchez. Mrs. Caly was a pleasure to work with. As a student assistant, I helped her organize lectures and roundtables on European politics and culture during which students were able to meet European ambassadors, ministers and consuls. She taught me how to plan out room reservations, flyers, sign in sheets and email notifications to professors and students studying Europe. During my time at the MEUCE, I was thus able to encounter many European officials, one of which was Ms. Sophie Delporte, Head of the Public Affairs Department at the French Consulate in Miami.

Given my fluency in French, this opened the door for me to complete an internship there as an apprentice translator and news reviewer. I got to work with the Consulate Press attaché Mrs. Cluzet-Bertot, meet the French Consul General Philippe Létrilliart and even shake the hand of one of the French ministers while he was visiting!

Choosing to pursue this European Studies Certificate as part of my undergraduate career was one of the best decisions I made for myself while at FIU and I would recommend it to anyone who's interested in studying Europe.

CERTIFICATE IN EUROPEAN STUDIES

- The European Studies Certificate program is open to all who have an interest in any aspect of European civilization, past or present.
- It is an interdisciplinary program that draws on a broad range of courses from throughout FIU to complement a student's own interests.
- Approved study-abroad courses, including those offered by the Honors College, may be accepted for certificate credit.
- The program also offers a senior colloquium, "European Identities", that allows students the opportunity to engage in research on topics of their own choosing in close conjunction with a member of the Program Faculty.
- The certificate program is open to all students enrolled at FIU and to interested individuals in the community.
- Since Spring 2011, 96 Students obtained their Certificates in European Studies.

Requirements

The program requires 15 credits hours (5 courses) from at least 3 departments, distributed as follows:

► Language Requirements (3 credits)

One course in a European language at the intermediate (2000) level or above.

► Breadth Requirement (9 credits)

- Three courses at 3000-level or above, not all of which can be in either Social Science or in Humanities.
- Courses must be from an approved list published in the class schedule each term, or else contain substantial European content and approved by the Director.

Such courses are offered by the Departments of:

- Art and Art History,
- Economics,
- English, Environmental Studies,
- History,
- Humanities,
- International Relations,
- Modern Languages,
- Philosophy,
- Political Science,
- and Religion, among others.

► Exit Requirement (3 credits)

My name is Mauro Bagnariol, and I recently graduated Cum Laude from FIU with a BA in International Rela-

tions (Double Major in International Relations and Political Science). The paths that led me to the European Studies Certificate program are twofold: My father is Italian, & thus, holding Italian citizenship, my areas of interest have gravitated toward European themed topics. Also, a big wish of mine once I began my time at FIU was to participate in a study abroad program. Much to my delight and fortune, the Genoa, Italy Study Abroad program debuted in the summer of 2011. Participation in this program allowed me to take courses in Italy that would count toward the earning of my European Studies Certificate, and also to fulfill my desire of studying overseas while

soaking up the local culture. The Genoa Study Abroad program, in particular, was designed to encourage students to mingle with the locals and to live like a local. There were 15 other students who participated in the program. We were divided accordingly and paired up as roommates. My month in Genoa in this program is an experience that I will never forget. Spending an entire month in a country like Italy, studying European history and Italian history with Italian professors, while also indulging in the routines of a local, going grocery shopping for Genoese ingredients, and later cooking at my apartment and having my other group members over for dinner, is but one of the many very cherished memories from my time there. As part of the official program itinerary, we visited hubs of the Italian economy, such as Turin, which is the home of the Italian automotive industry, home to FIAT, and also visited Milan, one of the most important design capitals of the world. As a bonus, our group had the opportunity to visit a Milanese designer and the people inside were gracious enough to give their time to explain how the industry as a whole works, the importance of the Italian fashion industry and Italian design as a whole, and how it contributes greatly to the Italian economy and how its creativity and ingenuity has influence in other

countries. During our free time, my group mates and I did weekend excursions and visited Rome, Venice,

Florence, Pisa, and several other smaller cities. Renting bikes in the city of Lucca (on the advice of one of my group mates), and cycling around the city walls while taking in the Tuscan countryside still, to this day, remains one of the best memories of my time spent in Italy. It is not hyperbole to say that doing a program like this will change your perspective on life, broaden your horizons immensely and make you a much more well-rounded person. Our Dutch friends share their culture and history


On May 6th and 8th as part of the activities for Europe Week, the Miami-Florida European Center of Excellence, in collaboration with the Consulate General of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, screened two Dutch films.

On May 6, 2014, students in attendance were able to learn more about the life of the greatest painter Rembrandt, and took a brief look at many of his masterpieces. It was reminded that Rembrandt Harmenszoon van Rijn was universally regarded as the most important Dutch painter of the 17th century. Besides his paintings. many of his etching and drawings have become world famous. Rembrandt van Rijn was born on July, 15, 1606, but lived and worked in Amsterdam for most of his life. He produced his art in a period of Dutch history generally known as the Golden Age, and era in which Dutch culture, scholarship, trade, international power and political influence all flourished as never before.

On May 8, 2014, students and faculty were able to enjoy "Sonny Boy", a true story, exceptional love story between two apparently ordinary people. Rika a typical Dutch mother of four children, and Waldemar, a Surinam man seventeen year her junior. Their love could survive all the presumptions and obstructions of the cruel world outside, but was finally unable to cope with the brutal and devastating power of war.

These two films were particularly appreciated by the public. We would like to thank the Consulate General of the Netherlands for having given us the opportunity to enjoy the beautiful scenery and culture of the Netherlands.

"John-Paul II: I was looking for you"



On May 6, 2014 the Miami-Florida European Union Center of Excellence (MEUCE), alongside the American Institute for Polish Culture and the Honorary Consulate of Poland was proud to air a film showcasing the actions of one of Europe's proudest sons. This film, entitled "John Paul II: I was Looking for You", explores the life of Pope John Paul II. Students and faculty in attendance were able to learn a great deal about the influential Pope John Paul II, who was canonized as a Saint on April 27, 2014 in Vatican City. This film, entirely in Polish with English subtitles, represents the largest production in Polish Documentary film history, and featured over 90 days of shooting in 13 countries. Included in this documentary are interviews with esteemed religious leaders such as the 14th Dalai Lamai and the Patri-

arch of Constantinople Bartholomew I.

John Paul was born Karol Józef Wojtyła on May 18th, 1920 in Wadowice in the Republic of Poland, a tumultuous time for a nation sandwiched between two great European military powers. John Paul II would become a priest during World War II, when Germany was occupied by Nazi Germany. Following World War II, John Paul II would work to better the lives of thousands in Poland during the period of Soviet occupation of Poland. In 1978, John Paul II was elected to the Papacy by the College of Cardinals, where he would serve until his death on April 2nd 2005. The first non-Italian pope since the 16th century Pope John Paul II played a pivotal role in the liberation of Poland from Communist rule with his trips to the country in 1979. The



documentary covered this trip in great detail, and the abundance of commentary makes clear that John Paul II contributed a great deal to the rise of the 1980 Solidarity movement in Poland. One historian went as far as to argue that "When Pope John Paul II kissed the ground at the Warsaw airport he began the process by which communism in Poland – and ultimately elsewhere in Europe – would come to an end."

Pope John Paul II's contributions were not limited to the field of politics. In addition to the role he played in the demise of Communism, John Paul II also canonized 483 Saints, more than his predecessors of the 500 years prior combined. His efforts to create dialogue between those of the Catholic faith and other Christians, Jews. and Muslims has lead to camaraderie and communication between often antagonistic religious systems. Whatever faith one belongs to, it is assured that many of the citizens of Poland, as well as multitudes around the globe, remember Pope John Paul II with sublime reverence.

Europe's Democracy Deficit Lack of voter interest in EU elections could lead to a win for right -wing extremism by Maxime Larivé | on May 22nd, 2014

On Sunday, May 25, European citizens in all 28 countries of the European Union will vote for their representatives in the European Parliament, one of the key institutions of the EU that has gained increasing influence in recent years. All 751 seats are up for reelection, making it one of the most democratic bodies of the EU. That's the good news. The bad news is that Europeans, in a worrisome trend, have turned out in fewer and fewer numbers to vote since the parliament's first election in 1979.

The history of the European Parliament, however, gives a clear, and unfortunate indication of democratic decline throughout Europe. In 1979, for the first time in the parliament's history. deputies were elected by universal suffrage. Since then, the popular vote for European deputies has decreased, while the powers of the parliament have increased. For instance, the 2009 Treaty of Lisbon increased the role and contribution of the parliament, which now has "more power, more responsibility." Many argue that the EU has, since its inception, been confronting a serious democratic deficit. In some ways, this was inevitable, considering how the EU was created back in 1954 and its current institutional setup. In its early years, the EU was simply a common market of two products, coal and steel, pooled under the supranational institution called the High Authority. The EU was an economic entity, a structure created to strengthen peace and stability on the European continent through economic cooperation. Seventy years later, the EU has succeeded in this mission and continues to do so. War between the largest European powerhouses is unthinkable. At the same time, the EU has become an entity unforeseen. With a more powerful European Parliament, European citizens have a chance to shape the EU of tomorrow.

Since the implementation of the Treaty

of Lisbon, the parliament received new powers in three important areas: political, legislative and budgetary. In term of political power, the parliament will be electing the president of the European Commission, a supranational body charged with managing important policies and agendas, such as the current negotiations with the United States on the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership. Additionally, the parliament has seen its role increase over the supervision of EU foreign policy and the European External Action Service, the EU's diplomatic corps. In terms of legislative power, the parliament's decision-making capabilities have increased on policies like justice, freedom and security. Last, but not least, there's the European Parliament's oversight over the budget of the EU. These increases in power are serious and should be understood as such by European citizens.

Unfortunately, popular attention to the upcoming elections remains low, with many Europeans expected to abstain from voting. The lack of interest in this election cycle sends mixed signals to Europe's neighbors, such as Ukraine and Algeria, currently engaged in the fight for democracy in their respective countries. But not all the blame should be placed on European citizens. European deputies in parliament have largely shunned their duties on transparency, limited their interactions with citizens, and contributed to the poor perception of this institution in the European psyche.

In France, political parties have been divided into mostly right- and left-wing factions. With the record unpopularity of current leftist president, François Hollande, the popularity of the right, especially the extreme right, has increased. Such sentiment in France and beyond could reverberate in parliamentary elections this weekend. It is not certain that the French far right will win the majority, but mainstream politicians have been axiomatic in vilifying the European Union throughout its history, and principally since the beginning of the Eurozone crisis. This has been the case of governments in Greece, Spain, Italy, France, the UK and other European countries.

But the upcoming elections will not just have repercussions for Europe, but also for the rest of the world. The EU's soft power lies in its democratic values and institutions. With the threat of farright parties dominating the elections, espousing narrow political and economic agendas and even xenophobic policies, Sunday's elections could be a stain on European democracy. If European history can tell us one thing, it is that extremes are never the right solution. Only when the majority of citizens mobilize themselves through elections can such extremism be voted down.

Announcement Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership (TTIP)



To further intensify the transatlantic economic relationship, in February 2013, the U.S. and the EU agreed to launch negotiations for a comprehensive transatlantic trade and investment partnership (TTIP). Designed to further liberalize all sectors of the transatlantic economy—including manufactured goods, agricultural products, services and investment—TTIP seeks to eliminate border tariffs and investment restrictions while fostering more compatible regulatory requirements.

The ideal TTIP agreement would not only remove the main trading obstacles of the past, but also look toward the future: aiming to prevent new regulatory barriers; establishing mechanisms that enable a further deepening of economic integration over time; and enhancing cooperation for the development of rules and principles on global issues of common concern.

Negotiations launched in July 2013 in Washington D.C.: the second round of negotiations took place in Brussels in November 2013, and thereafter negotiations alternate between the EU (Brussels) and the U.S. (Washington DC metro area). Talks may continue for around two years, although the actual timing depends on the discussions themselves.

The sixth TTIP negotiation is scheduled for the week of July 14 in Brussels.




